During UNL Homecoming weekend in October, the Alpha Epsilon Chapter (AE) celebrated our fortunate blessings of being awarded two Peterson Awards in the past two years. Last year the active chapter earned the distinction of receiving the Gold Peterson Award and being ranked the number four Sigma Chi chapter in the nation! This year we achieved a Blue Peterson Award and were very competitive again as the chapter was ranked in the top ten Sigma Chi chapters nationally. The brothers have worked hard as a chapter and have learned how challenging it is to sustain consistent, outstanding results each semester.

I am very proud of the Chapter's unwillingness to be mediocre. When AE held elections this past year, the platforms presented for Consul and ProConsul were outstanding! The visions presented by all candidates were similar, and all talked about leadership within Sigma Chi Fraternity, UNL, and by being the best men they can be individually to achieve these goals. This attitude of not settling, and wanting to be a "top three house" on UNL campus lead to the summer rush program recruiting 40 pledges for

this fall's pledge class! We initiated 37 and our house is 120 members strong!

It was a great honor for me to receive this award, and I firmly believe it reflects all of the hard work the active chapter has put forth these past few years. CONSUL CHAPTER UPDATE

Prothers, as my time as Consul draws to a close, I'm excited to share the incredible strides we've made at Alpha Epsilon this year. Thanks to the generous contributions from alumni, chapter parents, and our Housing Corporation, we've been able to renovate the common areas on the first floor of our chapter house. These upgrades include new couches, freshly painted walls, refinished floors in the John Wayne Room, and new study tables that provide dedicated space for our brothers to study and collaborate.

This summer, our recruitment efforts were a great success with the addition of Hank Phillips '27, Hank Kriegler '27, and Mason Bach '27 leading our recruitment team. We welcomed 38 new brothers to Sigma Chi, making the fall '24 pledge class one of the most diverse in recent years. These brothers come from all across Nebraska — Omaha to North Platte — as well as nine other states. Under the guidance of Magister Grady Wright '25, they completed their journey to full brotherhood with initiation on September 28th.

Our chapter's philanthropic efforts have reached unprecedented heights. Under the leadership of Philanthropy Chair **Joseph Maier '25**, we are on track to raise over \$30,000 this year. A highlight was our "Clash Against Cancer" fundraiser, a joint effort with the Beta Mu Chapter at CU Boulder, which raised over \$22,000 in connection with the CU-Nebraska Game, all of which will go to support the Huntsman Cancer Foundation.

Beyond our walls, our brothers continue to excel. Four brothers — Gus Kriegler '26, Taelin Baumann '26, Kayden Kettler '27, and Trenton Andringa '27 — were recently selected to join the Order of Omega Greek Honor Society, bringing our chapter's representation in the society to over 20 members. Additionally, many of our brothers are actively involved across campus, with eight currently holding executive roles in various UNL clubs. We also celebrated our chapter advisor, Dr. Mike Cover '90, for receiving the prestigious Erwin L. LeClerg Outstanding Chapter Advisor Award.

Looking ahead to the spring semester, I'm incredibly proud of where we stand as a chapter. We also have ambitious plans for this year's Derby Days, aiming to set a new record for funds raised in support of the Huntsman Cancer Foundation. PHILANTHROPY

The Alpha Epsilon chapter had an incredible philanthropic fall semester! We raised over \$10,000 for the Huntsman Cancer Foundation in the first three months of the school year alone.

Three different fundraising events helped us reach that goal. First, we partnered with the Beta Mu chapter at Colorado Boulder for the 'Clash Against Cancer' in which we competed with our rival school to raise money for Huntsman.

We also hosted two different philanthropy events here on campus. In September, we held our annual 'Sigma Carnival' event with a

dunk tank and carnival food. In October, we partnered with the Gamma Phi Beta sorority for the first-ever 'Pumpkin Smash,' which was the philanthropic highlight of the semester.

We delivered over 400 pumpkins to the Sigma Chi house from a local pumpkin patch. Students from around campus bought tickets to paint the pumpkins or smash them, all while enjoying apple cider and cookies. We made over \$5,000 on that night alone and were thrilled to donate the extra pumpkins to the Malone Center, a community program for underprivileged kids.
